| <p>Igbo Tidbit</p> <p>Igbo people are an ethnic group who live in south eastern Nigeria. They speak Igbo and other dialects and today, a majority of them also speak English as a result of British colonialism. The Igbo are one of the largest and most influential ethnic groups in Nigeria.</p> | <p>Yoruba Tidbit</p> <p>Yoruba people are also one of the largest ethnic groups in West Africa. They are found predominantly in Nigeria but there are also indigenous Yoruba communities in Cuba, Brazil, Haiti, Puerto Rico, and USA among others.</p> |
| <p>Talking drums Tidbit</p> <p>The talking drum is a West African instrument whose pitch can be regulated, making it sound as if the drum "talks."
