The U.S. version of Vogue is edited by an English woman who has lived in New York City for a long time. Each month, Vogue publishes a magazine based entirely on fashion, life, and design.</p>

**Tidbit**

Betty Crocker is a brand name and trademark in North America. The name was developed in 1921 as a way to give a personalized response to consumer product questions. The name 'Betty' was selected because it was viewed as a cheery, all-American name.

**kumquat-and-fennel smash**  
**Tidbit**

Kumquat  
Fennel  
A kumquat-and-fennel smash is a nonalcoholic drink made to a base of orange juice and tonic water. Agave nectar (sweetener), kumquat, and fennel are also added. The fennel provides licorice notes in a less emphatic manner.

**yuzu and rose spritz**  
**Definition**

The yuzu is a citrus fruit originating in East Asia. The fruit looks like a very small grapefruit. The spritz is a wine-based cocktail commonly served as an aperitif in northern Italy. However, the article refers to a non-alcoholic drink called yuzu and rose spritz in which the signature ingredient is fresh yuzu juice.

**sashimi**  
**Tidbit**

Sashimi is a Japanese delicacy. It consists of very fresh raw seafood sliced into thin pieces. It is served with a dipping sauce, which can be soy sauce with wasabi paste or condiments such as grated fresh ginger.

**brioche**

Brioche is a French pastry. It is a soft, light-textured bread made from eggs, butter, flour, and yeast, formed into a roll or a bun.
