<p>Extinct Cognate</p> <p>extinct- extinto</p> <p>A cognate is a word that is identical or nearly identical in spelling in one language and in another. A cognate also has the same meaning in both languages.</p> <p>In a more technical sense cognates are two words that have a common origin or etymology.</p>	<p>Fake Antonyms</p> <p>real – fake real – falso</p> <p>These words are antonyms which means they are opposite in meaning.</p>
<p>dewy-eyed Figure of speech</p> <p>dewy-eyed dew- humedecer o nublar</p> <p>If you call someone ‘dewy-eyed’ you are criticizing them for being unrealistic.</p>	<p>‘laird’s lugs’ scottish regional english</p> <p>‘laird’s lugs’- Lord’s ears. Las orejas del Lord laird = Lord (a title of nobility)</p> <p>These ‘laird’s lugs’ were barred windows above the fireplace that allowed the Lord to spy by listening through them.</p>
<p>Would Modal Verb</p> <p>Would</p> <p>Use would plus a base form of a verb to talk about a repeated action in the past.</p> <p>‘The Lord would spy on whatever was being talked in the hall below.</p>	<p>Fire Multiple meaning</p> <p>to fire-despedir a alguien de su trabajo to fire- descarga de armas de fuego a fire-un incendio</p> <p>In the article it refers to the act of using weapons at an enemy.</p>
